STR & SOR Funding

- Beginning in 2017, California received \$89.4 million over 2 years through the State Targeted Response (STR) grant
 - The STR initially funded the Hub & Spoke System and Tribal MAT Project
- In 2018, California received \$176 million over 2 years through the State Opioid Response (SOR) grant
 - The SOR funded over 30 MAT projects statewide



\$265 million

SOR 2 Funding

- In 2019 Congress approved an additional \$1.5 billion to fund state opioid response efforts.
- In 2020 SAMHSA released the next round of funds for the SOR grant. California will receive \$210 million over 2 years through the grant.
- New flexibility for spending related to treatment of stimulant use disorder

Youth Projects

Project	Description
Dept. of Juvenile Justice Youth Peer Mentor Program	Continue to deliver the 8-week youth opioid peer training program at 6 additional juvenile justice pilot sites across CA.
Youth Opioid Response	Fund new local grants for prevention, treatment, and recovery services for youth (12 to 24).
Youth Recovery Support	Add new sites for youth recovery services through life skills curricula, including education, housing, employment, finance, leadership, and empowerment.



Housing Projects

Project	Description
Riverside Supportive Housing	Continue funding recovery housing and peer support for individuals with opioid use disorders (OUD).
San Francisco Recovery Residences	Continue funding recovery housing and peer support for individuals with an OUD.
Homeless Recovery Housing	Expand funding for recovery housing and peer support for approximately 1,000 individuals with an OUD in Northern California & Central Valley.



Clinical Projects

Project	Description
California Hub and Spoke System	Continue the Hub & Spoke System with a new administrative entity. Informational webinar for Hub and Spokes on May 5, 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.
Emergency Department Bridge Program	Continue the ED Bridge program and fund new hospitals and emergency rooms for opioid treatment.
MAT Access Points	Add additional new clinical service MAT Access Points across CA.
Treating Addiction in Primary Care	Fund Cohort #4 for primary care clinics and behavioral health clinics on MAT integration.



Statewide Projects

Project	Description
Naloxone Distribution Project	Continue distribution of free naloxone across CA.
California Highway Patrol	Fund additional trainings for CHP on SUD recognition and referral to services.
CA Opioid Coalitions	Implement CA Opioid Safety Network and provide technical assistance to new and current opioid coalitions; Fund new and existing local Opioid Safety Coalitions
DUI MAT Integration	Add sites for MAT pilot identification and referral project for DUI treatment programs.
Expanding MAT in County Criminal Justice Settings	Support current 29 county jail systems and expand counties for MAT to individuals in county jails, drug courts and diversion programs (like LEAD). Continue to assist CDCR with MAT expansion in prisons.
Residential TA and Project Consulting	Provide new training to SUD residential providers and consulting services for DHCS.



Statewide Projects

Project	Description
Residency Training	Fund additional Primary Care Residency Programs to include or enhance MAT curriculums.
Statewide Media Campaign	Statewide media campaign focused on decreasing stigma around MAT treatment and methamphetamine.
Transitions of Care	Add new counties in pilot for SUD/ODD transitions across treatment systems.
Waivered Prescriber Support	Continue training for waivered physicians.
California Substance Use Line and California Poison Control System	Continue 24/7 telephone line for health care providers from addiction experts, and tele-consultation through the California Poison Control System.
Evaluation	Continue to evaluate the impact of various projects; including research and new approaches in addressing meth, housing and Tribal MAT.
Tribal	Tribal projects will expand in SOR 2. More information coming in Tribal MAT Webinar on <u>April 30th.</u>



General Requirements

Projects should focus on adding *new* subgrantees rather than funding current contracted organizations

Projects should build flexibility for in-person and virtual convenings, due to COVID-19

Projects should build telehealth infrastructure to deliver treatment and recovery services

Projects should build services based on limited Menu Options

Data will be collected by UCLA and due on a quarterly basis through online portal

Projects providing direct treatment and recovery services will require GPRA interviews



Stimulants: What are they?

- **Cocaine:** made from the coca plant that's often snorted or smoked.
- **Amphetamines:** prescription stimulants such as Adderall, Dexedrine, Ritalin and Concerta, which are used to treat attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD).
- **Methamphetamine (meth):** derived from amphetamines, that speeds up the body's system and appears as a pill or powder.
- **Khat:** made from the leaves and twigs, evergreen shrub. Active ingredients are cathine and cathinone.
- **MDMA:** commonly known as ecstasy or Molly, which has stimulant and hallucinogenic properties.



Stimulant Use Disorder Treatment

No FDA-approved medications

- Practitioners experimenting and research ongoing
 - Bupropion (Wellbutrin)
 - Mirtazapine (Remeron)

Most efficacious: Behavioral therapies

- Contingency Management
- Community Reinforcement
- Cognitive Behavioral Therapy
- Motivational Interviewing
- Physical Exercise



DHCS Federal Grant Activities

DHCS released survey to counties in September 2020 to ascertain need, status of current services, and challenges

SOR 2 is targeting stimulant use disorder

- Statewide funding for new treatment access points
 - Focusing both on amphetamines generally, methamphetamines, and cocaine
- Statewide funding for prevention
- Addressing the need in communities of color



DHCS and UCLA 2020 County Survey Major Findings

Methamphetamine remains most common among stimulant types

MI, Counseling, and CBT were reported as most common treatment approaches

Many counties would like to use CM, but lack of funding has led to low initiation

Counties want to expand telehealth availability to treat stimulant use disorder

Cross Sector partnerships are highly effective

Need more guidelines, protocols, and toolkits and clinical trainings

Unaware of allowable services with federal funding



SOR 2 Efforts

- Build in stimulant use disorder treatment as an allowable activity and encourage implementation of prevention, treatment, and recovery
- Fund new access points specifically for stimulant use disorder services
 - UCLA-ISAP and AHP: Enhancing use of evidence-based programs for PSUD in Specialty Care Programs
 - RFA Period: 11/9/2020 – 12/18/2020
 - Project Period: 2/2021 – 9/2022
 - 10 Subgrantees across 2 cohorts as TRUST implementation Sites
 - The Center at Sierra Health Foundation - MAT Access Points
 - RFA Release: Winter 2020/21
 - Treatment: up to \$5M
 - Prevention: up to \$5M


About YOR California



YOR 1 Grantee Accomplishments



- 22 implementation grants and 10 planning grants
- YOR California grantees have:
 - Screened 14,000 youth for OUDs
 - Served nearly 6,000 youth with or at risk of OUDs or overdose death
 - Provided MAT to 331 youth and
 - Supported professional development education activities to over 400 behavioral health staff, teachers, school personnel, and other stakeholders.

YOR California 2 Goal



California Youth Opioid Response (YOR California) aims to:

- Strengthen capacity and increase access to MAT using the three Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved medications for the treatment of OUDs and reduce opioid overdose-related death among youth through evidence-based prevention, treatment, and recovery services.
- Support prevention, treatment, and services to address stimulant misuse and stimulant use disorders (StUDs), including cocaine and methamphetamine, among youth.




YOR 2 RFA At a Glance

- \$11 million available to increase access to quality OUD/StUD services for youth (ages 12-24)
- 2 Grant Types: Implementation Grants and Capacity Building only Grants
- Looking for leaders – interested in building partnerships to provide best available services for youth with StUD/OUD.
- Grantees engage in learning collaboratives and have robust TTA available to them
- Proposals Due January 15, 2021 5:00 p.m. PT
- Service Period: 18 months - February 15, 2021 to September 15, 2022



YOR California MAT & Service Model





Implementation Grants

- Execute strategies that increase capacity and access to quality, youth-specific services for youth ages 12-24 with or at risk of OUD/StUDs.
- Expand both access and quality of services for youth with OUD/StUDs using:
 - Evidence-based practices relevant for youth with OUD/StUDs
 - Appropriate tools and curricula with fidelity.
 - Promising practices (backed by research and/or with a demonstrated rationale for applicability) with the target population of youth served.
- Anticipated award amounts in the range of \$375,000 to \$700,000.

Capacity Building Only Grants



- To help a lead agency and its partners plan and develop procedures, policies, and activities that improve access to services but do not provide direct services for youth.
- Anticipated award amount \$50,000
- Statewide or specialized organizations that are not proposing direct service but include deliverables resulting in increased access to quality youth-relevant services may apply for capacity-building only awards above \$50,000.

Eligibility

- Nonprofit or for-profit business entities in good standing and authorized to do business in California, as well as any Tribal Authority, state or local government entity, school, or school district are eligible to apply.



Contracting

- Each application must have one lead agency that is responsible for the funds, deliverables, and adherence to the program requirements.
- Deliverable-based contract
- Submission of GPRA and other data
- Participation in YOR CA activities including learning collaboratives
- All funds must be expended by **September 15, 2022**



Application

- To receive email notifications of any updates to the frequently asked questions on the YOR California website, complete the **optional** Notice of Intent by December 29, 2020.




